Boys & Girls Clubs look at Logvy for clubhouse site

■ Would displace garden, dog park if approved

The Boys & Girls Clubs of St. Helena and Calistoga is proposing to lease Logvy Community Park land in order to build and operate an approximate 14,000 square-foot clubhouse.

According to a letter of interest to the city from the BGCSHC Executive Director Jay Templeton,

the site for the proposed project would be between the pool and the fairgrounds, currently home to the community garden and dog park.

The proposed lease of city park property for the new clubhouse is on the Sept. 16 city council agenda.

"The letter to the city is a framework for discussion," Templeton said in a statement this week in response to a Tribune

email. "The Boys & Girls Clubs want to be open, transparent and sensitive to the correct protocol for this proposed project. We wish to follow a process that provides for responses, input and guidance from the city's leadership and the community."

The city-owned property, located at 1401 North Oak St., would house the proposed facility that would include parking and exteri-

or improvements, signage, a foyer, game and art rooms, kitchen, eating area, restrooms, technology lab, academic/meeting room and a gymnasium.

The non-profit organization is asking to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the city to allow the BGCSHC to lease the land in exchange for a Joint Use Agreement, which would permit city and community use of the facility during non-club times.

According to Templeton, the BGCSHC would raise the necessary funds to build the facility and would provide the annual operating funds.

"Our draft timeline is a work in progress. It calls for two years of fundraising to achieve \$9.5 million, followed by a year of design, permitting and construction. Our hope is to have the new clubhouse open in the fall of 2017," Templeton said.

No damage here from earthquake

■ Napa bears brunt of 6.0 temblor on Sunday

Although Napa and American Canyon were severely impacted by the 6.0 temblor that surprised thousands of sleeping residents on Sunday, Calistoga escaped relatively unscathed, said city officials.

Immediately after the earthquake hit at 3:20 a.m., on-duty Calistoga police and fire department staff surveyed the community for signs of damage. In addition, public facilities such as the two water storage tanks and Kimball Dam reservoir were inspected with no evidence of damage.

In response to a request for assistance, Engine 19 with a crew of three firefighters was sent to the City of Napa.

"While residents in Calistoga got quite a jolt from the earthquake on Sunday there were no reports of damage or injury," said city manager Richard Spitler.

Hundreds of Calistogans felt the jolt and rumbling that followed, while some slept through the quake.

Meanwhile in Napa, spokesman Barry Martin said on Wednesday that city's initial gross estimate of damage to privately-owned structures, both homes and commercial properties in the City of Napa, is \$300 million. This figure does not include damage to public buildings or infrastructure, loss of business inventories, or general economic losses. It is not known what portion of this damage will be eligible for reimbursement from government or other sources.

A total of 209 patients have

Fairs compete for rides, food, money, patrons

Fairs are competing for contracts for the same handful of carnival ride companies, food vendors and marching bands as well as economic survival after the state cut all funding three years ago, a small crowd of fair supporters learned Tuesday.

The Napa County Fair Board Association hosted an informal community conversation about the decision

City council approves 3 for volunteer committees

■ Native Daughters to fly first flag on new pole, mayor appoints three

A new flag is approved to fly high, three committee appointments are confirmed, and a discussion about Logvy property is moved to a later date at the quick Aug. 19 Calistoga City Council meeting.

In honor of California Admission Day, the council approved the request by the Native Daughters of the Golden West to display their flag on the city's ceremonial flagpole during the week of Sept. 8.

California Admission Day is celebrated annually Sept. 9 to commemorate the anniversary of the 1850 admission of California into the Union as the thirty-first state.

The Native Daughters of the Golden West, a non-profit organization, was founded 109 years ago, which makes it one of the oldest associations of more than 5,000 diverse California born leaders. The Calistoga chapter currently has 77 members. Kathy McCloskey, of Calistoga chapter Parlor No. 145, proudly displayed the flag to the board and audience. The 3' x 5' flag includes the chapter's logo on the front and back.

Three committee representatives appointed by the mayor were confirmed by the council.

Applicant Hazel Cole was appointed to the Community Pool Advisory Committee, incumbent Brad Suhr was appointed to the Active Transportation Committee and Karen Chang to the Open Spaces Advisory Committee.

Canning asked City Manager

The new construction would mean the long-planned dog park and community garden would have to go or be moved to another

location. Following years of community discussion, the dog park was eventually erected on Logvy property in April 2013 after the volunteer group Cal Dogs raised funds for its construction. Dog park organizer Scott At-

kinson says having to eventually move the park was always part of the long-term plan. “We’ve known all along this was coming down the pike,” Atkinson said. He added that nearly everything used to build the dog park could be re-used when and if it’s time to find a new location. For gardening lovers, the possibility of relocating and replanting might not be as easy. The Calistoga Community Garden has been growing on Logvy property near the corner of Washington and North Oak St. since July 2004. The garden is a cooperative venture between the city and Calistoga Community Garden, Inc., a public benefit tax-exempt organization, with a goal of providing opportunities to residents for an enhanced gardening experience. Currently 30 plots are made available annually on a first come, first served basis. A small fee is required to cover any operating expenses. Back in December, the Calistoga Joint Unified School Board reviewed a proposal to build a BGCSHC facility at the elementary school. The board sub-committee and Templeton presented a history, findings, and design schematics that included constructing the fa-

cility in the front area of the school, occupying much of Berry Field. Superintendent Dr. Esmeralda Mondragon said two floor plans were presented to the board and district staff. The first scheme occupied a total area of 16,340 sf, including an 8,440 sf gymnasium. “Berry Field was a major concern,” Mondragon said. Mondragon said the board was concerned there wasn’t enough acreage at the elementary school to house such a large project. The second plan, scaled down to 13,756 sf, left more of the field open and looked to be more of a possibility at the school, Mondragon said. The BGCSHC and the Calistoga Joint Unified School District entered into a MOU Jan. 14 with the intent to move towards a formal agreement for the funding, design and construction of the project. At the May 5 school board meeting it was noted that in consideration of the BGCSHC interest in partnering with the district to build a facility on campus, the district could potentially recognize cost savings if the elementary school kitchen upgrades were performed at same time as new construction. According to Mondragon that’s around the time when plans for building at the elementary school began to diminish. With the construction of the new gymnasium at the high school, the district didn’t need a gym at the elementary school. She added that different properties and locations were

always on the table for the project, including engaging in discussions with the city. “It would be wonderful to have in our community in Calistoga,” Mondragon said of the BGCSHC. Mondragon added that as long as the programs and services are housed in a close proximity to the elementary school and accessible to the needs of the community, she is happy to see negotiations go through. If the project moves from a school site to city property, the clubhouse plans will not be required to be reviewed by the Division of the State Architect. “We have been planning this project as a concept for more than a year, including completing a comprehensive feasibility study. We are now moving ahead internally with the steps to fund and construct a new Boys & Girls Club facility in Calistoga, similar to our existing Club in St. Helena,” Templeton said. Primary use of the facility would operate as a full-service Boys & Girls Club, with city and community uses available during non-club hours. Normal club operating hours are Mon. through Fri. 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. during the school year. During the summer and non-school days, hours would be Mon. through Fri. 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. “We believe the need and opportunity are great, and that we have the resources and momentum to be successful in this exceptionally important endeavor,” Templeton said.

to hold a one-day Napa County Fair and the challenges facing the historic celebration in the future.

Fair CEO Carlene Moore and board chair Karan Schlegel conducted the meeting that drew 30 people to the Butler Pavilion with concerns over the decision to hold a one-day fair and to split off events from the July 4 celebration and hold individual festivities under a marketing plan calling for several “Celebrate!” activities throughout the year.

The traditional four-day county fair is unsustainable because of cost, competition, and a drop in attendance, the group was told. The decision to make it a one-day fair was an economic one that came with changes that upset some people and were supported by others.

“This year’s fair was alive and vibrant,” offered attendee Amy Thomason-Richardson. “I’d rather have a one-day fair that was well done than a longer one scraped together.”

When Edgar Massoletti asked about why multi-day fairs had been replaced this year by a one-day fair, Moore said it was because last year’s fair lost \$52,000 and this year’s one-day fair broke even. Schlegel said the board had not yet decided whether or not the 2015 fair would stay a single-day or return to a multi-day schedule.

The conversation turned to the midway carnival rides, food vendors and product demonstrations.

Moore said there are nine carnival ride companies in the state and 31 fairs vying for their services. Of the nine, she said four do not travel north of Bakersfield and one has a reputation for a less than desirable safety record. And, because the Napa County Fair is so small in attendance, it is difficult to compete with Sonoma, Marin and Solano county fairs which run longer and draw larger attendance.

“Even though we all may want a multi-day experience, there isn’t the business to support it. It truly is a challenge,” she said.

Moore also added that because the Napa County Fair is wedded to the July 4 holiday when the demand for fair vendors is highest and competition is fierce, choices can be difficult.

“If we’re deadest on it having to be on the July 4 weekend, people have to lower their standards on safety and cleanliness,” she said.

Diane Barrett asked about bringing sprint car racing back to the fair, but Moore countered that the two events attract different crowds.

Rose Beck, who was raised here with the races and fairs, agreed and said “and racers don’t want to supplement the fair.”

Sylvia Marciano asked if other dates have been considered for the fair to eliminate the competition for rides, but Moore said that the board of directors felt having the fair and the parade on July 4 “was important to Calistoga and the county.”

Chris Canning, who was there representing the chamber of com-

merce, asked about downvalley competition, which Schlegel acknowledged was growing with American canyon and Napa now hosting July 4 parades and fireworks shows, keeping those residents from travelling to Calistoga as they have in the past.

Clarence Luvisi said although he saw the fair board’s job as one of running five separate businesses with the RV park, golf course, county fair, race track and event center, he thought the board had to focus on getting the local youth interested in agriculture because of the farming heritage in the community.

The group threw out both ideas and questions about the future of the fair and the fairgrounds, speedway, golf course and other amenities, but the priority, Moore said, was keeping the county fair at the core of their mission.

Board member Bob Beck explained that because July 4 and the Fiesta Mexicana were the most popular events of the year, separating them into two fundraisers made sense.

“We decided why not build them into successful events as stand alones?” Beck said.

“This isn’t about weathering the storm,” Moore said. “We had to change something. We don’t have all the answers and not everything we do is right.”

When someone asked what the community can do to help, Moore said that 30 million people visit fairs annually, and those who attend fairs can help by volunteering, participating in the fair activities and talking to other people.

Unfortunately, I missed the earthquake

I know this may sound weird, but I’m sorry to have missed last Sunday’s 6.0 (or 6.1) earthquake. I hate it when that happens. But on the other hand, I am a bit relieved that I wasn’t shaken out of bed at 3:20 a.m. and scared ut of my wits.

I was awake, but we were in Idaho on our way back from a white water rafting trip on the Snake River with Americas Rafting Company. It was a auction prize Jan and Edgar Mazzoletti bought at the Soroptimists Crab Feed in 2012 (full disclosure) offered by our niece and nephew who own the company. We couldn’t go last year because of my breast cancer bout, but it was on for this summer. We joined eight other Calistogans on the water from Wednesday to Saturday and had a great time.

Hells Canyon is a 10-mile wide canyon located along the border of eastern Oregon, eastern Washington and western Idaho. It is part of the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area and is North America’s deepest river gorge. There is no cell phone service for miles and miles, days and days.

We were told the weather could be 90-120° in the canyon during daytime and in the 70’s at night and to come prepared. Luckily, during the four days we were on the Snake it never reached 90° and was over-cast part of most days. We slept in two-man tents and ate three times a day and drank plenty of beer and wine to go along with generous and tasty meals.

One evening the guides baited a line with a small bass and a few hours later we all watched Parker reel in an eight-foot long sturgeon, a prehistoric bottom feeder that was really weird looking. After stroking its white belly and staring at its gaping mouth, and with a toast of Calistoga wine, it was released and sent on its way downstream.

I happily stayed in the oar boat, riding the class 2, 3 and 4 waves holding onto the seat and not minding the splashing waves of water that soaked me and the boat. Other more adventuresome Calistogans took their turns in the paddle boat or bravely ran the rapids in single and double kayaks. I am too practical for that nonsense.

We drifted along the river and during the trip spotted river otters, mountain goats, deer, osprey and eagle. We hiked up deer trails to caves where the Nez Perce left primitive drawings of themselves and their animals on the undersides of rocks, visited wooden cabins where homesteaders tried to eke out a living in the 1800s. Boards for the walls, floors and roofs were all three feet long because they had to be packed in on horses.

For the life of me I cannot understand what would drive someone to live in Hells Canyon for more than a week, but my hat’s off to Grace Jordan and her family who made a go of it for several years at the Kirkwood Ranch and wrote a book about her life there during the Depression. We knew we were close to the landing for the ranch because there, in white-wash paint for all to see on a dark rock facing the river, were the words “Grace Slept Here.”

I’m sorry I missed the earthquake, but I am glad I got to meet Grace, the spirit of Hells Canyon.

been treated at Queen of the Valley Hospital with 18 admitted for some period of time. The total of known water line breaks in need of repair was 83 at Wednesday. Some 14 leaks were repaired by midweek on large diameter water lines and 8 more repair sites were still active. Less than 500 customers remained without water service by yesterday.

As of Wednesday, the 60 inspectors at work continued the second round of evaluations of damaged structures. There are 632 structures in Napa that have been tagged – 116 are on the red-tag list and 513 are on the yellow tag list. A red tag means the structure is uninhabitable due to damage from the quake; a yellow tag indicates caution should be used. In the unincorporated area, county inspectors have completed 108 inspections to date. Of these, 16 were red-tagged and 21 were yellow tagged.

The Napa Valley Vintners (NVV) nonprofit trade association announced Wednesday that it will donate \$10 million to create a Napa Valley Community Disaster Relief Fund to help meet the immediate needs of local residents and local businesses impacted by Sunday's earthquake.

For Napa County residents, funding will be available for one-time immediate needs as well as short term assistance for things like temporary housing; basic needs (food, water, etc.); medical care and counseling; and repairs for immediate safety concerns, like replacement windows, debris removal or fallen chimneys.

For local businesses, the fund will provide assistance to help get them up and running allowing employees to return to work and local commerce to continue. Area non-profits can use funds to help them restore operations and they can also apply for general support grants to serve earthquake victims. Mney will come from the NVV's annual Auction Napa Valley charity event.

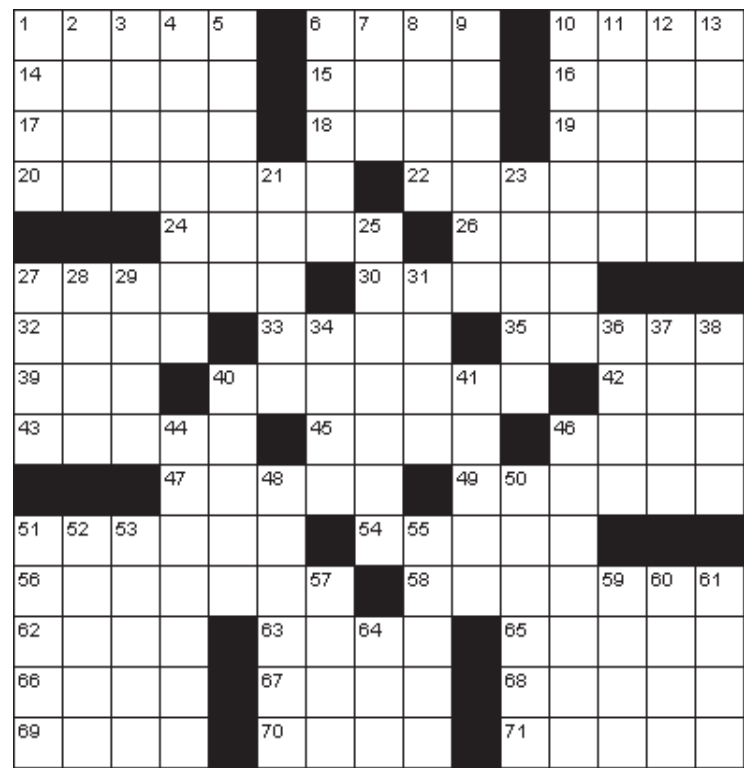

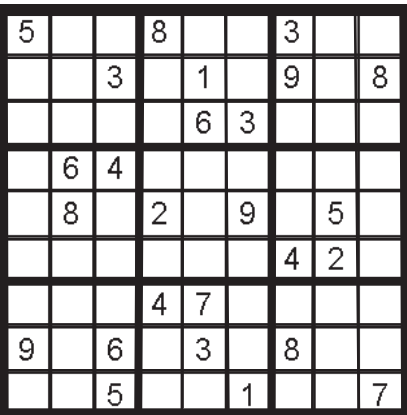

Abreu looking to battle for title at Vermeil Classic

Hall of Fame induction dinner tonight

After reaching speeds of nearly 200 mph on the Bonneville salt, Damien Gardner has driven a sprint car faster in a straight line than any racer in the world.

At this weekend’s Louie Vermeil Classic, Gardner is hoping to be the fastest man driving in circles on Calistoga Speedway’s clay oval as he tries to nail down a championship in the USAC/CRA sprint car series.

The Concord, Calif. driver won the last race of the series at Perris Speedway in Riverside County two weeks ago, his seventh victory in 12 races so far this year, and brings a dominating 155 point lead into the championship fight as he attempts to dethrone the man who has held that title for the last five years, Mike Spencer, of Temecula.

Both have won the prestigious Louie Vermeil Classic in past years and are being chased by more than two dozen of the best non-wing, traditional sprint car teams in the west as the series makes its annual appearance in Northern California.

But a spoiler in the crowd could be a local driver, Bud Kaeding, of Campbell, Calif. who came within a bumper of sweeping both nights

last year, beating Gardner on Saturday night and taking a very close second place to NASCAR driver Kyle Larson on Sunday. “Calistoga is one of my favorite places and where we run really good,” said Kaeding, who finished third at the track’s most recent race in June.

With its long straightaways and sweeping corners, the Calistoga half-mile is one of the largest dirt tracks in the western U.S. where momentum and keeping up wheel speed in the corners is important to win.

The Louie Vermeil Classic also will include the non-wing USAC Western States Midget Series, where a championship battle is going hot and heavy between teammates in a field that will also feature some of the top national drivers, including Napa Valley’s Rico Abreu.

The Louie Vermeil Classic will feature main event races for both sprint cars and midgets on Saturday and Sunday, August 30, 31 at the Napa County Fairgrounds. The weekend begins with the third annual induction dinner for the Calistoga Speedway Hall of Fame on Friday evening, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in the Tubbs Building on the fairgrounds.
