## AU Energy sent back to drawing board

The Calistoga Planning Commission on Wednesdsay continued a public hearing on AU Energy's request for a use permit to build a new Shell gas station and convenience store at the intersection of Petrified Forest Road and Foothill Boulevard, in essence telling the applicant to go back to the drawing board.

However, based on the design that was presented Wednesday, commissioners also directed staff to return with a motion denying the project.

"I appreciate that this project could basically start with a white sheet of paper and come back," commissioner Tim Wilkes said.

Current plans call for a fivepump gas station, convenience store, self-serve car wash and a sit-down restuarant at 2449 Foothill Boulevard. A 1,000-gallon propane tank and dispenser would also be installed.

## Canning to seek 4th mayoral term

Incumbent Chris Canning said this week that he will seek a fourth term as mayor of Calistoga in the Nov. 6 election.

He revealed he planned to pick up the paperwork on Thursday and return it by 5 p.m. today, the deadline for candidates to file nomination papers with the city.

Meanwhile, a fourth man – High Street resident Douglas Allan - had picked up the nomination paperwork from city clerk Kathy Flamson but hadn't returned it as of Wednesday, she said.

If Allan throws his hat in the ring, he would be on the ballot with incumbents Jim Barnes and Gary Kraus, as well as newcomer Donald Williams, all three of whom have filed the necessary paperwork to run.

"After very serious consideration and deliberation, I have chosen to file for reelection," Canning told the Tribune on See **ELECTION** on page 7

### **Clover Flat may** face sanctions over latest fire

Clover Flat Landfill and its management could be facing monetary fines and operating restrictions following the third fire there this year.

A Notice of Violation was sent this week to the landfill, said David Morrison, director of the Napa County Planning, Building, and **Environmental Services Department** which has regulatory authority over the operation.

A special meeting of the Upper Valley Waste Management Agency, which contracts with the privately owned landfill for county services, has been scheduled for Monday morning in Yountville to discuss the situation and potential remedial measures, UVA director Steven Lederer confirmed in an email Wednesday.

"Although the exact cause of the most recent fire is currently unknown, the Clover Flat Landfill facility has a concerning history of fires," read the Notice of Violation sent to Clover Flat's Bob Pestoni, who also owns and manages the Upper Valley Disposal Company in St. Helena. "Over the past year, the Napa County Local Enforceemtn Agency (LEA) and CalFire/Napa County Fire has observed and reported repeated areas of concern

## Calistoga Jr./Sr. High School put on accreditation probation

Calistoga Junior Senior High School's accreditation status has been deemed "probationary," and administrators have two years to address the issues that led reviewers to bestow that label.

The school's short-comings include not having a Single Plan for Student Achievement, as well as no long-term learning plan for students, and a lack of staff knowledge about and input into the district's guiding blueprint – the Local Control Accountability Plan, or LCAP.

"Calistoga Junior and Senior High School (7-12) deviates significantly from the ACS WASC criteria for accreditation in one or more critical areas," states a May 3 letter from the Accrediting Commission for Schools, Western Association of Schools and Colleges (ACS/WASC) – the agency responsible for accrediting public, charter

and overseas schools throughout California, Hawaii, Guam, Asia, the Pacific Region, the Middle East, Africa and Europe.

"It is the decision of the Commission to grant Probationary Accreditation Status to Calistoga Junior and Senior High School

through June 30, 2020, with a two-day visit in 2020," the letter stated.

While the accreditation process is voluntary, it serves as an evaluation tool to highlight what a school is doing right as well as areas where improvement is needed. Being accredited assures a community that the school is a "trustworthy institution for student learning" and "validates the integrity of the school's program and transcripts," according to the ACS WASC website.

To become accredited or to retain accreditation, each school must conduct an indepth self-study and then host a visiting ACS

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
