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# Checker's restaurant is closing

Tomorrow is final day for popular local eatery; new owners said to be planning pizza-focused menu

The last of four downtown restaurants coowned by Ron Goldin and Mark Young will officially close its doors tomorrow after 32 years of service in Calistoga.

Goldin announced Monday that Checkers, the "legendary" pizzeria and Italian food eatery, was sold to Elizabeth Montana and Kenny Luciero, who plan to continue offering pizza and other Italian dishes when they take over the restaurant starting Sunday.

Aside from the menu concept, little is known about the new restaurant that will occupy the space at 1414 Lincoln Ave. but Goldin said patrons can expect to see the restaurant closed for an unknown period of time while the new owners remodel the interior. He said they have not yet decided on a new name for the restaurant.

However, Montana and Luciero will be at the restaurant tonight from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. to answer the public's questions and to "greet the locals and establish themselves as the new pizza paddle bearers," Goldin said.

Checkers was the first restaurant Goldin opened and operated in downtown Calistoga, in May 1987, followed by Brannan's Grill, Flat Iron and Barolo, all of which he opened with Young and are now closed.

Brannan's Grill was shuttered in late July this year due to a downturn in business, unre-

Photographer Chick Harrity Celaya delays retirement to June 30, 2019

Of the many U.S. presidents Chick Harrity photographed as part of the White House press pool, George H. W. Bush, he said, was the nicest.

A U.S. Congressman before being elected to the oval office in 1988, the 41st president, who died Nov. 30 at the age of 94, respected the journalists covering him and enjoyed hanging out with them, Harrity said this week.

"Of the 10 presidents that I was lucky enough to photograph, George H.W. Bush was one of my favorites," said Harrity, who upon hearing of the former president's passing, went looking through his files for a few of the images he shot over the years. "He was just the nicest guy."

Bush was representing Texas' 7th District in the House of Representatives when Harrity began covering the White House for the



Associated Press in 1968. Lyndon B. Johnson was president.

By the time Bush became president in 1989, Harrity was covering the White House for U.S. New & World Report, and had followed Bush on the campaign trail while also traveling around the country with TV journalist and author David Frost for a U.S. News book called "The Making of a President." At the time of his presidency, Bush's Air Force One press corps included one photo journalist
