Patient with coronavirus in isolation at Napa hospital

A patient with a confirmed case of the novel coronavirus was in isolation this week at Napa's Queen of the Valley Medical Center, Napa County officials announced.

A second patient with symptoms was said to be "under investigation at the hospital." Neither patient is a resident of Napa County.

According to a joint statement from Napa County and hospital of-

ficials released Tuesday, the two patients arrived at the Queen of the Valley on Monday from Travis Air Force Base in Solano County. The patients were flown to Travis AFB from Japan, where they were under quarantine on the Diamond Princess cruise ship.

Among the cruise ship passengers flown to Travis AFB, seven were identified as needing testing or hospitalization, officials reported. Five of the seven patients were sent to local

It was a big night for men and women in blue on Tuesday as the Calistoga Police Department bestowed annual awards for service above and beyond, introduced its newest recruit, and promoted a veteran to Acting Sergeant.

The Calistoga City Council meeting room was packed with family members and law enforcement colleagues as Police Chief Mitch Celaya honored Ryan Jung as his department's 2019 Offier of the Year, and announced that Griselda Loza had been named 2019 Dispatcher of the Year.

Celaya then reported

Geothermal element to remain, get an update

■ Fairgrounds financing moves forward; city awards contract for fire risk review

Several longtime spa owners on Tuesday convinced the City Council that eliminating a section of the General Plan dedicated to Calistoga's most precious resource was not a good idea.

Council members directed Planning and Building director Lynn Goldberg to not only leave the geothermal water element as a stand-alone chapter but to work with interested spa owners to update the goals, objectives and policies for use and protection of the underground heated acquiter.

Goldberg had recommended eliminating the stand-alone Geothermal Element of the General Plan and wrapping parts of it into the Infrastructure Element, which she and Public Works director Derek Rayner have spent nearly two years updating. The Infrastructure Element contains information and policy guidance on the city's utility infrastructure – namely water and wastewater systems.

The council had been set to consider adoption of the update two weeks ago but postponed the decision after Calistoga Spa Hot Springs co-owner Diane Barrett raised some concerns about the
