

Council bypasses Williams, asking for others to apply

Applications will be taken until Jan. 30 from any registered voter in the city limits interested in filling the seat vacated by the sudden resignation of Carl Sherrill, councilmembers decided this week, bypassing the selection of Charlotte Williams, who placed third in the November elections.

Sherrill resigned in a letter to fellow city councilmembers following a Dec. 18 meeting that resulted in fourth place Jim Barnes's appointment to the two years remaining in Mayor Chris Canning's term as a city councilmember. That night Williams' supporters erupted in angry protest following Barnes' selection, and Sherrill, who had championed her appointment, left the meeting saying he felt ill.

Williams and some of her supporters were in the audience Tuesday night, which, because of a heavy agenda, drew a standingroom-only crowd. In a brief dis-

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Library renovation plans turn page for computer-age users

Calistoga's library is prepping for a major renovation, one that Napa City-County Library personnel hope will make the little branch into a modern, highfunctioning building, meeting demands of patrons and staff alike.

The proposed remodel, which would cost \$600,000 or more, tackles a few building repairs, such as a new roof and heating and cooling system, but most of the work is focused on the interior a redesign of space.

Napa City-County Library Director Danis Kreimeier noted that because the 88-year-old building housing the library was not originally intended for this use, "it has all these little tiny rooms."

Kreimeier said the main emphasis of the new design is to make things more efficient and to provide more space for library materials and services.

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Excavation for new high school gym expected in next few weeks

Construction crews will start staking out foundations and building corners in preparation for excavation work on the new gymnasium at Calistoga High School in a few weeks.

Site work on the new \$12 million gymnasium and multi-purpose room/cafeteria at CHS should start in early February, Jeff Threet, program manager for the project's construction management company Caldwell Flores Winters, Inc. told school district trustees this week.

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new gym were held last May. The new gym will be built behind the existing building put up in the 1960s as a temporary gymnasium after the original one at CHS burned down. A request for bids last October brought 220 submissions for construction of the new gymnasium, 79 on the sitework, and 145 bids on the multipurpose/student union, Threet reported. Money for the projects comes from a \$42 million general obligation bond approved by 65 percent of voters in Nov. 2010. Measure A improvements, broken into three phases, include constructing a new gym and multipurpose room at CHS, modernizing the elementary school, improving libraries, classrooms roofing, heating and air conditioning, technology and renewable energy projects in Phase 1

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
