

Lava Vine Winery decision delayed

Joseph and Jill Cabral of Lava Vine asked for a two-week continuance Wednesday night of their application for a conditional use permit to build a new winery.

In an e-mail dated Jan. 18, Joseph Cabral asked for the extension, having told the planning department that more time was needed for city staff to conduct research on traffic impacts for the proposed winery, which would be located on the same property as their tasting room at 965 Silverado Trial.

The Cabrals hope to build a new 30,000 gallon (approximately

Storm drops 7.8' of rain in 5 days

This week's warm, iconic sunny days belie the stormy weekend that poured almost eight inches of rain onto Calistoga streets and hillsides in a five-day passing cold front

Tribune weatherman Larry Kuzdenyi says the storm dropped 4.1 inches of precipitation from

Thursday through Saturday, and added another 3.7 inches between Sunday and Monday for a total of 7.8 inches of rainfall.

"We were way behind when this thing started," Kuzdenyi said. "We had a total of 5.5 inches for the year, now we're up to 13.3 inches."

The measured rainfall by this time in 2011 was an impressive 22.2 inches by Jan. 24. In 2011, storms would fill rain gauges for a grand total of 51.05 inches falling during the rain season, which runs from July 1 to June 30.

The last time it rained in Calistoga was on Dec. 30, Kuzdenyi said, when he measured 0.05 inches in his two rain gauges on Fourth Street.

"I had to shake the gauge to

CJUSD dollar per student outlay favorable compared to neighbors

Calistoga's school district has one of the highest dollars-perstudent ratios when compared to neighboring areas, according to a private research company.

Based on figures provided by www.education.com, an indedesigned for parent use, Calistoga Joint Unified School District (CJUSD) spends \$12,823 per student each year.

To put that in perspective, Tribune staff selected five other districts to run comparisons with: St. Helena, Napa Valley, Windsor, Cloverdale and Healdsburg. Also

Elder scam hits close to home

If it weren't for an alert bookkeeper at Safeway, Virginia Dooley would have lost \$4,600 to a scam artist on Monday.

Still shaking, the 92-year-old Dooley came into the Tribune office that afternoon to share her story, in hopes she could save other seniors from experiencing the same nightmare.

It had all started that morning when Dooley and her husband Jess, 95, received a phone call. It was her grandson Jim. He said he was calling from Bolivia, where he had flown to be in a friend's wedding. He told her he had been in a serious car accident and was in jail, because the authorities thought it was his fault. Jim said they would release him from jail if Dooley wired him \$4,600.

His voice sounded odd, Dooley said. But Jim explained that his nose had been broken in the accident, so he was talking funny. He asked her not to call anyone else in the family, because he was embar-

City debates area, costs for repaying upgrades

A plan to reimburse Solage Resort for the \$4 million it spent on city required infrastructure improvements still needs tweaking, councilmembers said this week.

The City Council and property owners met Tuesday in a study session to discuss the proposed boundaries of a benefit district and allocation of costs per parcel for paying for water, sewer and storm drain improvements that the resort made above and beyond what it needed for its own proj-

In 2001 when the City Council approved the Palisades Spa and Resort Project on a 25.86 acre site on the Silverado Trail, developers agreed to install enough utility improvements to meet its own
