CES exceeds state API goal, scores a perfect 10

■ Elementary school students continue to improve

The Calistoga Elementary School (CES) has been on the rise for the last four years in its Academic Performance Index (API) ratings and scores and has cause to celebrate this week.

After a 37-point jump in its 2012 scores, CES surpassed the state goal of 800 points with an 817, received a two point bump in its state ranking, and reached its ultimate goal of a 10 rating compared to schools with similar demographics.

"We're definitely elated that CES scored over 800 for the first time ever," said Superintendent Esmeralda Mondragon.

Each school is compared to a list of 100 similar schools throughout the state. For Calistoga Elementary that included, in this general geographic area, Bellevue Union Elementary in Sonoma County, McPherson Elementary in Napa County, San Rafael City Elementary in Marin County, and William L. Cobb Elementary in San Francisco City.

The Similar Schools ranking of 1 to 10 takes into account the number of English learners, percentage of socio-economically disadvantaged students, those on

Planning commission approves design stages of Family Apartments

The planning commission adopted two resolutions that moved Calistoga Family Apartments into its next phase of design to construct a four-building apartment complex on the site of Calistoga Gardens Nursing Home on Washington Street next to Logvy Community Park.

Calistoga The Family Apartments plan is being put forth by Corporation for Better Housing (CBH), a 501 (c)(3) non-profit from Southern California that specializes in affordable housing for seniors and low income households. The plan was presented to the planning commission in

Free pool passes for local kids part of proposed city budget

Every child and teenager in Calistoga will receive a free pool pass for the summer if the proposed 2013/2014 budget is adopted by the city council next week.

At a special budget session on Tuesday, council members were told that because of impact fees paid by new development, they had at least \$200,000 in discretionary funding to spend as they pleased.

"My goal is every child swims free every year," Mayor Chris Canning said.

The cost of subsidizing free pool passes for anyone 18 years and younger is roughly \$14,000, said city aquatics and recreation manager Olivia Lemen. The free passes would take effect July 1, when the new fiscal year begins. The city will also subsidize operations of the pool for the pre-season and post-season if enough pool passes are sold to warrant the extended dates.

The Calistoga Family Center was granted its request for \$20,000 to continue its senior assistance programs; Calistoga Affordable Housing will get \$10,000 for its Rebuilding Calistoga program
