

# Latest vote count reveals Barnes, Kraus keep lead

Challenger Doug Cook misses winning city council seat by 50 votes

Jim Barnes and Gary Krause will keep their seats on city council according to the latest vote results released last Friday by the county elections department.

Elections official John Tuteur said another 788 votes had been counted since Nov. 4, but the tally didn't change the outcome from the Tuesday general election: Jim Barnes captured the most votes at 689, up from 424 on Nov. 4 to reap 35.5 percent of the 1,940 votes cast. Incumbent Gary Kraus added 267 votes to his original 383 to

collect a total of 650 votes or 30.9 percent; and first-time challenger Doug Cook finished third at 601 votes, 256 votes ahead of his Nov. 4 count of 345.

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### **City's water use drops** 22% over last October

### Residential customers reduce usage 23 %

Calistogans achieved a 22 percent community-wide reduction in water consumption compared to October of 2013, announced Anais Hall, the city's water conservation program manager.

Residential water customers reduced consumption by 23 percent and commercial customers reduced consumption by 3 percent. Following Best Management

Practices, public facilities, such as the community pool, reduced water use over 50 percent this October compared to October of 2013, Hall said in a statement released Wednesday.

The Calistoga Water Conservation Program offers programs to help residents and businesses save water. Residential water customers are eligible for free water use assessments and conservation kits,

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
