## Williams leads in council race; two incumbents tied for second

Challenger and political-newcomer Donald Williams was leading the two incumbents in the race for Calistoga City Council by 193 votes after the Napa County Elections Department's initial ballot count Tuesday night.

But with thousands of ballots from throughout Napa County left to count, the final outcome of that race – as well as several others - could be vastly different come Fridav night.

The county's Registrar of Voters John Tuteur on Wednesday told the Tribune that he estimates as many as 35,000 ballots remain to be processed. He said he figures as many as 1.100 of those ballots will be from Calistoga.

Election results released Tuesday night included all ballots that had been received either by U.S. mail or delivered to a drop box or vote center by Monday evening, said Tu-

teur. A new count to be conducted on Friday will include all ballots received and verified through Thursday, including those cast or dropped off on Election Day.

## **PG&E** says Calistoga power a top priority

Keeping the city of Calistoga energized when conditions call for a power shutdown is among Pacific Gas & Electric's top priorities, a senior official said Wednesday night at a meeting addressing impacts to the community from the utility company's new wildfire safety policy.

In fact, with conditions ripe for a second planned

power shutoff yesterday, PG&E had earlier in the week installed a giant, temporary generator north of the city that would keep the lights on in the event that the power grid is turned off.

"Obviously, the situation and the way the grid is configured is somewhat unique here, and especially with this community having experienced this

## Majority of English learner students test well

Test results designed to gauge the progress of how well non-English-speaking students are transitioning to the language show that 76 percent scored in the two highest levels of the assessments.

Calistoga Joint Unified School District's Michael DeFrancesco, director of Educational Services, told school trustees Monday night that of the 301 students in the district who took the 2017-18 English Language Proficiency Assessment for California, 118 scored at level four (well developed) and 112 scored at level three, moderately developed.

'When we determine what level the English learner is, then we can design what level of support they're gonna get," DeFrancesco said. "The score from this test is also one of the critera we include

Caltrans is gearing up to repair three more Calistoga-area bridges even as work on the Lincoln Avenue span nears completion.

The state transportation agency is hosting an open house for residents on Tuesday to offer information on what it is calling the "Bridge Preventive Maintenance and Scour Measures Project." The public is also invited to comment on an environmental review document that shows work on the Garnett Creek Branch bridge, the Garnett Creek bridge and the "No Name Creek" bridge "will not sig-

## Buy a mattress, support CHS band

Music teacher Nina Pedersen and her Calistoga High School band students are hosting a new-mattress sale this Sunday to help them get to a Hollywood competition in April.

Aside from raising funds for that fourday trip – where the CHS band will compete at the Heritage Festival for the fourth time - the mattress fundraiser will also benefit music programs for the high school as well

nificantly affect the quality of the environment."

All three bridges are on Highway 29 north of Calistoga. The Garnett Creek Branch bridge. built in 1920, is approximately 1.8 miles north of town at post mile 38.96, followed by the Garnett Creek bridge (originally built in 1902 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places) at post mile 39.08. The No Name Creek bridge, built in 1923, is further up the highway at post mile 42.83.

Work on the three-bridge project, which isn't likely to begin before 2021, according to a Caltrans spokesperson, will "address existing scour damage and perform preventive maintenance to reduce future scour damage.

"The structural integrity of all
