Rancho residents vote to contribute to generator costs

By an approval vote of 128-2, residents in the Rancho de Calistoga Mobilehome Park agreed to a pass-through maintenance increase to pay for the operating costs of a commercial generator that will power homes during PSPS events in 2021 and beyond.

The homeowners association put the charge to a vote in the 182-space park last month, said homeowner association president Vinny Pasquariello. "Overwhelmingly, everyone wanted the generator," he said. "We're tired of being without power."

The power unit comes from a collaboration between the City of Calistoga and park owner HCA of Novato. City manager Mike Kirn said the city applied for and received a \$300,000 Public Safety Power Shutoff Resiliency Grant from the state's Governor's Office of Emergency Services earlier this year. Some \$50,000 was allocated to install a generator at the High Street water pump station, leaving \$250,000 available for other PSPS projects. In February the city council and HAC started talking about how to power the senior citizens park during power shutoffs, even though it is a privately held business.

"We recognized that the community was comprised of a vulnerable senior population living on a fixed income, and some had medical needs," said Kirn. "We wanted to help, but the city council wanted the park owners to have some skin

After 26 years of service to the Calistoga Police Department – almost half his lifetime – Sgt. Tim Martin is turning in his official department uniform, firearm and handcuffs for good. He gets to keep his silver badge No. 115.

Martin is retiring just before the end of the year around Dec. 26, said Police Chief Mitch Celaya.

"It is challenging to try to capture all that Tim did over his career or truly describe in words his experience, skills and contributions to the city and the community," Celaya said.

Martin graduated from the Santa Rosa Police Academy in 1987 and began his career as a Reserve Officer in Vallejo from 1991 to 1994. In November of 1994, Martin was hired as a contract officer for the CPD. He was promoted to a permanent police
